# Restore women's rights in the Sex Discrimination Act

### The issue

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The Sex Discrimination Act (1984) was **created to protect women** from discrimination and **ensure our safety, dignity, and equality**; however, **amendments** in 2013 **removed the biological definitions of 'woman' and 'man'** and introduced 'gender identity.'

These changes have **eroded the legal clarity of protections** for women and undermined our ability to access **female-only spaces**, **services**, **and opportunities**.

### The implications



- This has blurred the distinction between sex and gender in law, leading to confusion and undermining protections for women and girls.
- States and territories have since introduced sex self-identification laws, allowing men to access to female-only spaces by self-identifying as women.

### Impacts on women's rights



- Reduced legal clarity regarding women's sex-based protections.
- Challenges to women's access to female-only spaces, including crisis centres, shelters, hospital wards, and changing facilities.
- Legal disputes over women's sports, grants, awards, and services specifically designed for women.
- Cases where raising concerns about these issues has resulted in legal challenges.

## Why this matters to women voters



Women voters care deeply about protecting our rights to safety, privacy, and dignity. Female-only spaces are essential for addressing systemic inequalities we face in a male-dominated society. These protections are not just legal—they are vital for achieving meaningful equality.

# What we need from you as a candidate



- 1. **Commit to restoring protections**: Reinstate clear legal definitions of "woman" and "man" in the Sex Discrimination Act.
- 2. **Defend female-only spaces**: Ensure that organisations understand it is lawful to provide female-only spaces under the Act.
- 3. **Prioritise women's safety**: Advocate for policies that protect women's access to female-only services and opportunities.
